U.S. Undersea Warfare News

General Dynamics Subsidiary Awarded \$203M for Design Support on Navy Columbia-Class Submarines

Scott Nicholas, Gov Con Wire, June 23

General Dynamics Electric Boat subsidiary has received a \$203.1 million contract modification to increase design support for the U.S. Navy's Columbia-class nuclear submarines.

The service branch awarded the modification as part of the Navy and the U.K.'s joint Common Missile Compartment program, the Defense Department said Thursday.

The Pentagon issued a Milestone B approval to the potential \$125 billion Columbia-class submarine program in January.

The Naval Sea Systems Command will obligate the full amount of the modification from the service branch's fiscal year 2017 shipbuilding and conversion, research, development, test and evaluation funds as well as U.K. foreign military sales funds.

Work will occur in Connecticut, Maine, Rhode Island and Virginia through October 2017.

U.S.S. Avalon

Whenever I travel, I try to remember to “Google” the area I am visiting for Submarine Memorials. This past May, I was travelling on the Pacific Coast Highway and passed the U.S.S. Avalon, (DSRV-2) in Morro Bay, California.

Launched in July 1972 and deactivated in 2000, the Avalon was the second of two identical Mystic-class Deep Submergence Rescue Vehicles rated to dive up to 5000 feet. Lockheed built both submarines in response to the loss of the USS Thresher so that the Navy would have a way to rescue submarine crews trapped far beneath the ocean surface.

The DSRVs offered a quick response, all weather capable

system designed for transport by land, air, on or beneath the sea. The submarine is 49 feet long, 8 feet in diameter, and weighs 38 tons. The sub could carry 24

passengers at a time in addition to her crew of two pilots and two rescue personnel. The sub was stationed at Naval Air Station Coronado Island, in San Diego and was never required to conduct an actual rescue operation. Avalon was donated to the Naval Historical Center in Washington, D.C. and is currently on long-term loan at the Morro Bay Maritime Museum.



I checked the USSVI website to see if any of our Perch Base members were assigned to the Avalon. I found none, but two members of our sister White Mountain Base, Buck Biddle and Ed Hergert were on the Avalon around 1980.

The Brink of Disaster

For those who are not familiar with the roles and missions of the DSRVs they were designed and built primarily for the purpose of submarine rescue. However, they are also used for scientific research and ocean recovery when needed. The subs can be anywhere in the world and on station within 38 hours of a reported submarine loss. Various support vessels are configured to carry the vehicles including some foreign vessels.



The DSRV crew is trained to meet the challenges of any situation with one submersible on standby for a rescue mission on call 24/7. Training was usually carried out off the coast of southern California and at San Clemente Island. Occasional fly away missions are carried out to test the operational rescue scenario.

What happens when the submersible itself becomes the casualty at sea and who will come to the rescue? There is a process in place to initiate a message to CincPacFleet to report a casualty situation if the DSRV cannot return to the surface.

Sometime in 1981 during a routine operation out at San Clemente DSRV Avalon became trapped on the bottom and was unable lift off. I don't specifically remember the date or the dive number. It was first dive conducted and I believe the mission was a routine dive to 5,000 feet to test all systems for integrity. During this dive, I was acting Surface coordinator and the RV pilot was the OIC with a co-pilot and several other crew.

We were operating from the support ship Transquest from Lockheed Ocean Laboratories. Everything was normal, no problems with the launch or with the RV at the point of diving. Permission to dive was granted and the RV opened the ballast vents and thrust down to 100 feet for an initial trim before proceeding to the bottom. RV reported that trim was satisfactory and proceeding with mission, occasional reports of passing depths were sent via underwater telephone.

Crew on the Transquest was tracking the RVs position using a directional hydrophone and Transponder interrogator for range. A loran unit was used to track latitude and longitude of the support vessel. The dive was expected to last from 8 to ten hours.

“Transquest this is Avalon, on the bottom and unable to maneuver, cannot lift off”. There was a sense of urgency in the transmission which to me did not sound good as there are a number of reasons this can happen such as loss of vertical thrusters, becoming snagged on a submerged structure or extreme weight gain. From my experience, I have learned that what you do in the first 15 seconds is the most important and will define the outcome of most situations. I call this the 15 second rule. I immediately recommended that the RV blow main ballast in 50 pound increments and then use full vertical thruster after each blow until able to lift off. If I remember right each thruster has 400 pounds of lift force for a total of 800. There are two tanks in the RV that are used to drain the hatch interface bell used to attach to a disabled sub. If these were flooded they could gain about 2700 lbs of water. Flooding of the main spheres was not reported and if they were the crew would not survive. Sea pressure at that depth is about 2300 psi. After a few minutes, the RV reported that they were leaving the bottom and on the way to the surface. Air blown into the ballast bags will expand and reduce the vehicle weight. Tracking from the support vessel continued to ensure safe distance to avoid collision at the surface. All recovery procedures were made ready for immediate recovery of the vehicle should it lose buoyancy and return to the depths.

All were relieved when the RV was sighted at the surface and was recovered aboard the Transquest in record time. An investigation determined that the two transfer tanks were flooding from sea. The flooding was caused by the tank relief valves being installed backwards. The valves are intended to vent excessive pressure from the inside of the tanks to sea but instead were allowing sea water to enter the tanks. The valves were worked and installed by Lockheed personnel during in port maintenance.

The tanks were not completely flooded and this was due to the immediate action to get the RV on the way to the surface, further delay may have required rescue from the surface. I was happy that I did not have to send the CincPacFleet Message.

Russian Submarine

A gigantic new research submarine designed by Russia will travel underneath ice floes, mapping its underwater surroundings with a pair of huge plane-like wings. The sub will help Moscow exploit its Arctic frontier as it prepares to harvest previously untouchable natural resources.

The Arctic Research Submarine was designed by the famous Rubin Design Bureau, which was also responsible for the [Typhoon-class missile submarines](#), the largest subs ever built. This vessel will weigh in at 13,280 tons, making easily the largest civilian research submersible ever built, and will be 442 feet long. The sub will have a maximum speed of 12.6 knots and a crew of 40.

The most striking detail is the presence of two sets of wing-like sonar receivers that give the sub a futuristic appearance. The "wings," which retract into the hull like the blade of a pocket knife, are meant to receive sonar signals broadcast from the ship's hull. This allows the Arctic Research Submarine to image its surroundings in all directions as it cruises along underwater at a leisurely 3 knots.

H.I. Sutton, the analyst behind the [Covert Shores submarine web site](#) and [book of the same name](#), says about the sub: "From analysis of the model displayed by the design bureau, the wing structures are close to 165 feet (50 meters) long, so it will have a wingspan of about 330 feet (100 meters). This is much greater than any aircraft that has ever flown." A graphic made by Sutton (see above) shows the submarine will have an even greater "wingspan" than an [Airbus A380 jumbo jet](#).

Sutton doesn't believe the wings have any hydrodynamic use, however. "It is unlikely that the wings will be used to generate lift like an aircraft. That would be less efficient because it would have to constantly use its control surfaces to maintain a precise depth. This would also generate noise which could make the sonar less effective."

Although built to operate under the arctic ice, the submarine's sheer size will make navigating tough at times. "There will be many places in the Arctic where the submarine cannot go because its wings will make to too wide to navigate the many ice columns which protrude downwards from the ice cap," Sutton explains. "These can extend downwards for hundreds of feet or even to the sea floor."

As a civilian survey submarine, the ship will be unarmed. It will incorporate the ability to deploy and fetch remotely operated vehicles (underwater drones) and be capable of operating at depths of up to 1,300 feet.

Russia is eager to secure mineral and energy mining rights in the Arctic, in areas becoming more accessible as global warming reduces the amount of pack ice. Moscow has made [bold underwater territorial claims in the Arctic](#) extending past the traditional 200 mile Economic Exclusion Zone claimed by all countries, including parts of the North Pole. In 2007, Sutton points out, Russia used mini-submarines to plant its flag on the sea bed 14,000 feet beneath the North Pole.
